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THE SHARKS ARE COMING: The Grand Rapids Public Museum Splashes Into Summer with Blockbuster Sharks Exhibit

GRAND RAPIDS, MI - *Sharks*, a new blockbuster exhibition from the Australian Museum, is set to take center stage at the Grand Rapids Public Museum (GRPM) for a three-month appearance starting June 7, 2025. Highlighting the latest science, and with deep cultural overlays, *Sharks* invites visitors to explore the diversity of these ancient fishes.

Sharks invites families, students, and enthusiasts into a world dominated by members of the shark family to explore their genetic diversity, territories, interactions, and significance to ocean ecosystems.

Visitors will encounter nine life-sized, scientifically accurate models, including the now extinct 270-million-year-old Helicoprion (also known as the Buzzsaw Shark); the Bull Shark, which lives in freshwater for extended periods of time; and the Great White Shark, one of the most famous (and feared) species of shark. Other sharks on display include the Tiger Shark, Greynurse Shark, and Hammerhead Shark.

Visitors will learn about sharks through artifacts and tactile displays, which include touchables such as a megalodon jaw, shark skin recreations, and a Great White tooth. Immersive and interactive displays allow guests to navigate through a shark's body via a 3-D interactive scan, adapt a shark to evolve and survive in different environments, and see the world in a 360-degree view, through the eyes of a Hammerhead Shark. Large projections and a specially designed 'oceanarium' showcasing the majesty and power of sharks swimming through the ocean create a dramatic immersive experience.

According to the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), a quarter of the world's sharks are threatened with extinction. The exhibition presents the very latest information on conservation, sharks' impact on oceans, and efforts to protect sharks. Shark safety is also highlighted, enabling visitors to make informed choices.

"People love sharks and we can't wait to welcome community members of all ages to explore and learn about this diverse and resilient species," said Matt Witkowski, the GRPM's VP of Marketing and Public Relations. "The exhibit is equal parts fun and educational, immersing visitors in rich visuals, compelling storytelling, and expertly crafted models that offer fresh perspectives on this often misunderstood species."

On June 6, 2025, starting at 5 p.m., the night before *Sharks* opens to the public, GRPM members will have exclusive access to explore the exhibit's 100 specimens, 9 life-sized shark models, hands-on displays, and more. Members can enjoy shark-themed activities, a cash bar that will include a sharky mocktail for kids, and access to all 3 floors of the Museum. There is still time to become a member and attend this special preview.

In anticipation of this exhibit's arrival at the GRPM, Shark has landed at Gerald R. Ford International Airport and will be touring around the city as a special promotion for the exhibit. The GRPM is asking community members where Shark should go next. Shark is excited to check out The Blue Bridge, Calder Plaza, Art Prize murals, and more!
